






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EDITORIAL

The magazine has an important part to play as one of our channels of communication in the Ministry Area. At one time (and in the living memory of many of us), a parish magazine was the only formal means of moving ideas around – most usually from the top downwards. Nowadays, the magazine is just one element in a complicated mix of communication channels: we now have a sophisticated website that curious people outside the churches can use as a window into our church life; we use social media that displays us to the outside world and to one another by recording, reporting and announcing our activities and plans; we still, of course, use older methods of internal communication like notice boards, posters, weekly bulletins, handouts, reports and other printed documents; we also use, incessantly, the fastest and most unreliable form of communication, the spoken word!

Because this mixture has grown up organically, it's useful now and then to review the role of individual items in the list, including this magazine, and to do that bearing in mind the available resources — in our case, critically, the very limited number of people who wish to act as editors. We know that the magazine is important to people; we also think that, because we need to do what is practicable and because the magazine shouldn't duplicate what is done better in other forms of communication, it's time, from the start of 2026, to reduce the number of issues each year to four (February, May, August and November).

This will mean concentrating on what *only* a magazine can do: that is, publishing extended writing. This, in turn, entails expecting notices, reports and so on to move into the *Facebook* page and into other channels of communication. The change would not exclude any of the present routine articles (like *Around the Churches*, for example) that are capable of transforming themselves into extended features simply by taking a more seasonal (rather than monthly) view. These plans have been communicated already to those who need to know about them at this stage. December's magazine will invite readers' views and we will soon contact contributors with detailed information and ideas about a way forward for all of you who write this magazine.

THE CLERGY LETTER



Dear friends,

I must start with a confession as we head into the hinterland between autumn and winter. (Although November is 'technically' autumn according to the meteorological calendar, let's face it, most of us are definitely heading into winter-mode by the end of the month at the very least!)

My confession is this - I have a sneaky feeling that as a member of the clergy I should be spending my spare time on high-brow pursuits (such as appreciating fine architecture, having opinions on art, reading books in foreign languages etc.) but I really don't. My idea of a relaxing evening off consists of something along the lines of simply slobbing-out on the sofa and watching some nonsensical tv series - not necessarily a film (as they take too much time and/or focus!) but perhaps some kind of comedy series or, failing that, maybe a light hearted drama/mystery series. And 'the algorithm' knows this!

I know that the algorithm knows this because I regularly get emails from the various streaming services letting me know of programmes they think I might like: 'What's coming up in November'; 'Only a few weeks left to catch...'; 'Here's what other people who like ... are also watching'. And I want to ignore these messages. I don't want to be predictable. I really don't want a computer profiling me and accurately identifying the kind of thing that I'll enjoy! (For the record, and for those of you who don't have a carefully-honed algorithm tracking your watching habits, 'Slow Horses', 'Taskmaster', and 'Only Murders in the Building' are all ticking the boxes for us at the moment.)

But with each new email I feel a building pressure reminding me of all the things that I'm yet to catch up on that they emailed me about last month. I still haven't started the new series of 'Foundation', or 'Upload', and I'm still only halfway through 'Wednesday'. How am I ever going to catch-up, and what else am I missing out on?

Life can feel like this quite easily if we listen to all the voices around us telling us to do this or that, or to be careful not to miss something or other that's going to be the next big thing. While sometimes it can be useful to discover things, mostly it's not helpful - and we in the Church shouldn't be another voice adding to this cacophony of consumerism.

So this letter this month isn't going to be about telling you all of the exciting things we've got coming up across the Ministry Area over the next couple of months. It's not even going to be one of those clever misdirects where someone tells you they're not going to talk about something, but then uses it precisely as an opportunity to highlight that thing. (Cleverer people than I call this paralipsis apparently.) No, this is simply a reminder that it's ok to not rush along with the rhythm of the world around you (or what you're told the rhythm is!).

'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:10)

'The Lord is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger, and abounding in goodness' (Psalm 145:8; nb compare this with Exodus 34:6, the most cross-referenced verse in the Bible!)

'The fruit of the spirit is Love, joy, peace, patience...' (Galatians 5:22)

The rhythm that God seems to encourage us to develop, as a reflection of who He is, is much more gentle, much less pressured, and not one that constantly nags at us about the things we're missing.

Eugene Peterson in the wonderful 'The Message' - a paraphrase/translation of the Bible - rephrases the famous Matthew 11 passage as:

'Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest.

Walk with me and work with me - watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace.'

I like that. I think learning 'unforced rhythms of grace' is a good goal to have bouncing around in our heads in November.

The algorithms that might be analysing you don't know you. They don't have your best interests at heart. They're simply designed to get you to click more, buy more, watch more... more, more, more... Jesus' invitation though to 'learn the unforced rhythms of grace' is a much healthier and more helpful approach to life and to this season.

Like I said at the start of this letter, November can be thought of as being the hinterland between autumn and winter but it's also the month before December (I know - these are the kinds of insightful revelations that you have come to value and love in these clergy letters!) and in December everything goes particularly crazy. Everything gets turned all the way up to the maximum: parties, meals, nights out, events - and that covers schools, work, families... and churches too. It's the time of year when 'church' crops up most naturally and regularly in people's lives, and of course we want to welcome everyone in at every opportunity - but let's make sure that we're neither adding to the consumerism of 'more, more, more', nor feeling that we're overwhelmed by it in our own lives.

So, although things may tell us that we've got to be busy, or that the list of things demanding our attention is getting bigger and bigger or that, if we miss out on anything, we'll regret it - take a step back and breathe this November.

Enjoy the remnant of autumn or the beginning of winter (delete as per your taste or dependent on the weather!) and just enjoy this time of year - no matter whether you're nestled under a blanket watching TV, or going to fine art exhibitions! (And I think you can probably guess where I'd rather be.)

Lee Abbey - Signs of Life

Jenny and Brian Stonhold guide us through the art activities, the walks and the memories of long ago in this account of a special, reflective holiday.

We stayed at Lee Abbey, Devon at the beginning of October for an 'Art Week' exploring three Christian Symbols of Life: the Cross, Fish and Holy Spirit. Each



morning our tutor, Christian artist Lynne Pugh, introduced us to different images of the symbols and to biblical passages and hymns which referred to the symbols. Lynne shared her own faith journey and displayed large striking canvases of her art.

We were introduced to different techniques and art mediums including water colours and acrylic paints. After a coffee break, we created our own artwork. We painted a cross picture using masking tape for the outline then painted over it and when dried removed the tape to leave the cross shining clearly. On the second morning Lynne

provided us with small wooden fish shapes and plain cardboard bookmarks with tassels. We made a bookmark with acrylic paints and a fish symbol stuck on. Also we painted a pebble and stuck a fish symbol on to it.

On the final day we explored images of the Holy Spirit and made pictures showing flames and doves. Jenny also produced a picture using the theme of 'Pylon People' from a book of meditations by Cath Wooldridge. Lynne used this picture in her talk about the 'Power of the Cross' at the final evening Eucharist. 'Pylon People' are like electric pylons in that they touch heaven and do God's work while being daily grounded, or earthed, in God's Love. Just as pylons are connected and powered in a line so 'Pylon People' serve as the 'Body of Christ'

Meals provided an opportunity to hear from the community about their own faith journey and their experiences of living in the Lee Abbey Community. We had a meeting with the 'Friends of Lee Abbey' secretary, Lorraine Screen, and the new warden, David Hammond. Our vicar, Jimmy Young, and David became friends during their gap year in Swaziland, now known as Eswatini in southern Africa.



Some of us may remember a very vivid talk that Jimmy gave describing how he nearly killed himself and David driving round the winding roads.

During the afternoon we enjoyed walking down to Lee Bay and exploring the Lynton and Lynmouth area. We relived happy memories of August 1984 when we took a group of ten teenagers from our joint 'Anglican Free Church Youth Group' for a week's house party to the chalet next to Lee Bay. On the Sunday morning, we walked up the hill to join the Lee Abbey Community and guests for an open-air Eucharist.

Three of the young people from our 1984 summer house party are now Anglican priests. Lee Abbey Community has vacancies for the house and kitchen teams and for youth

and children activity instructors. Details can be found on their website (leeabbeydevon.org.uk/community).

St Cecilia – the patron saint of musicians



Our cover image this month is of one of the most famous of the Roman martyrs of the 2nd century, St Cecilia, who is remembered every year on the 22nd November.

As far as is known, she was born a noble lady of Rome who, despite her vow of virginity, was forced to marry an older pagan nobleman named Valerian. During the wedding, as the musicians played, Cecilia sat apart singing to God in her heart, and for that she was later declared the saint of musicians.

When the time came for her marriage to be consummated, Cecilia told Valerian that watching over her was an angel of

the Lord, who would punish him if he sexually violated her but would love him if he respected her virginity.

Understandably startled by this, Valerian then asked to see the angel for himself. Cecilia replied that to do so, he must go to the third milestone on the Via Appia and be baptised by the Bishop of Rome. Valerian seems to have been a good-natured husband because the story goes that he followed her suggestion, was baptised a Christian, and sure enough, saw the angel protecting his wife.

Being a Christian in those days was dangerous and, when the next wave of Roman persecutions began, Valerian and Cecilia were among those arrested. It is said that they died at the hands of the Roman prefect Turcius Almachius, perhaps in Sicily sometime between 176 and 180 AD.

One story goes that Cecilia was struck on the neck with a sword, and as she lay dying, asked that her house be converted into a church. Certainly, an early Roman Christian church, Santa Cecilia, was founded in the fourth century in the Trastevere section of Rome, reputedly on the site of the house in which she lived.

St Cecilia is frequently depicted playing a viola, a small organ, or other musical instrument and over the centuries, many musical compositions have been dedicated to her and her feast day has become the occasion for many concerts and musical festivals.



Dafydd Jones explains the profit that comes from reading the prophets

Ar fore dydd Mercher yn ddiweddar mae cynulleidfa'r gwasanaeth ecwmenaidd Cymraeg wedi bod yn astudio'r proffwydi. Wel, falle bod "astudio" yn air rhy barchus, wedi bod yn clywed ac yn meddwl amdanynt. Mae hi'n syndod cynifer o broffwydi fu wrthi'n clywed Gair Duw yn ystod canrifoedd yr Hen Destament. Y proffwydi mwyaf a'r proffwydi lleiaf. A'r "mwyaf" a'r "lleiaf" wedi ei benderfynu yn ôl hyd eu llyfrau, nid eu cynnwys. Un bennod yn unig sydd i lyfr Obadeia a honno'n cynnwys ond un ar hugain o adnodau. Y proffwyd Jeremeia oedd â mwy i'w ddweud na neb. Ei lyfr ef yw'r hiraf yn y Beibl i gyd ac yn cynnwys 3,002 o eiriau. Ewch i'w cyfrif os nad ydych chi'n fy nghredu!

Mae digon o hanesion diddorol wedi eu cofnodi yn y llyfrau hyn - a rhai eitha erchyll ac echrydus hefyd. Y stori ddiweddaraf i'w hadrodd yw un am Elias, unig broffwyd y gwir Dduw ar y pryd, yn cystadlu yn erbyn 450 o broffwydi Baal ac Ashera - gau broffwydi gau dduwiau. Roedd pobl Israel ar y pryd wedi dilyn eu brenin i addoli Baal. (Roedd yntau wedi dilyn ei wraig Jesebel i wneud hynny).

Gofynnwyd i Baal a'r gwir Dduw anfon fflam i gynnau tân ar allor i offrymu bustach. Methodd proffwydi Baal yn lân â chysylltu â'u "duw" nhw ond pan alwodd Elias ar ei Dduw i anfon fflam "dyma dân yn disgyn oddi wrth yr ARGLWYDD a llosgi'r offrwm, y coed, y cerrig a'r pridd, a hyd yn oed sychu'r dŵr oedd yn y ffos." A dyma i chi stori Hen Destament (yn hytrach na'r Testament

Newydd) - beth wnaeth Elias â phoffwydi Baal? Maddau iddynt a'u haddysgu am y gwir Dduw? Nage. Fe'u daliwyd i gyd a'u harwain at yr afon Ceson ac fe'u lladdwyd bob un.

Beth ynte oedd swydd yr holl broffwydi yma, y prif rai - Eseia, Jeremeia, Eseciel a Daniel, a'r llai pwysig a'r llai adnabyddus fel Habacuc a Nahum a Haggai? Derbyn Gair Duw a'i ddehongli a'i ddosbarthu i'w bobl. Y brif neges, dros y canrifoedd, wrth gwrs, oedd byw bywyd yn ôl safonau moesol - cariad a chymwynasgarwch. Roedd yna hefyd ddigon o broffwydo y byddai dinistr. Gwireddwyd hynny pan dinistriwyd Jerusalem ym 586CC a'r Iddewon an cael eu caethgludo i Fabilon - a hynny am drigain a deg o flynyddoedd.

Y broffwydoliaeth fwyaf wrth gwrs oedd y byddai'r Meseia'n dod i'r byd. Un o linach Dafydd, yn cael ei eni i wyryf o Nasareth ym Methlehem. Y byddai hwnnw'n was i bawb, y byddai'n dioddef yn ofnadwy, yn marw i achub eraill ac yn atgyfodi.

Oes yna broffwydo'n digwydd y dyddiau yma, dwedwch? Ydy pob un sy'n pregethu yn clywed gair Duw yn mynegi wrtho beth i'w ddweud yn y bregeth? Yn y Testament Newydd, Ioan Fedyddiwr yw'r unig broffwyd go iawn, daeth oes y proffwydi i ben oherwydd bod yr Ysbryd Glân yn gwneud eu gwaith. Daw'r Ysbryd Glân aton ni i gyd o bryd i'w gilydd.

A dyma i chi broffwydoliaeth: fe fydd rhai ohonoch chi'n ddigon chwilfrydig i ddarganfod mwy am y broffwydi. Yn y Beibl neu Wicipedia tybed?!

We've been looking at prophets on a Wednesday morning at the Welsh ecumenical service. An interesting crowd whether major ones like Jeremiah, Isaiah, Ezekiel and Daniel, or the lesser ones like Habakkuk, Obadiah, Nahum and Haggai. Some of the stories about them are the stuff of horror films. We went in some detail into the story of Elijah's competition with 450 of Baal's prophets to see whose god could light the fire to present a burnt offering of a bull. This was because Ahab, king of Israel at the time, had been persuaded by his wife, Jezebel (yes, her) to worship the false god Baal, and told all his people that they should do likewise.

Needless to say, Baal's prophets failed miserably in spite of performing all sorts of antics throughout the day. Elijah, on the other hand, got the people to douse his bull with water three times, along with the firewood and the altar then called to the Lord for a flame. What the Lord sent 'consumed the burnt offering, the wood, the stones and the dust'. He then had Baal's prophets seized, taken down to the river and killed. That's the Old Testament for you!

Prophecies are found in many religions and very often need to be deciphered and are open to different interpretations. We, as Christians, can look back at the words of the Old Testament prophets and think, yes, we believe that the Messiah was born in Bethlehem to a virgin, he was from the lineage of David, he did suffer and died for us and was raised from the dead. My prophecy (or maybe it's just hope) is that these few words have motivated some amongst you to find out more about the prophets, in the Bible. Or maybe Wikipedia!



On 28th September we held a Harvest Festival Service at Old St Lawrence Church, Lavernock. The altar was decorated with fruit and vegetables in a wheelbarrow, with a wheatsheaf and a bale of hay. The front of the church was decorated with pebbles and pumpkins. The service was very well attended and the singing superb. We had the usual selection of hymns and readings and, as always, a big thanks to Anne for playing the harmonium so well.

It was a real pleasure to have Susannah, our new curate, give the sermon. She is a tremendous asset

to our Ministry Area. The theme of the sermon was giving thanks for all that the Lord has given us in terms of crops and food. God gave the Israelites lots of good things, but he also knows that we don't always make the best use of them. God is asking us to remember Him and consider the way He asks us to live. When we celebrate harvest, we celebrate all that God has created and we also need to share what we have been given. In our world, famine is caused by nature but also by war. Humans have an amazing ability to hoard things, such as food or money, but we need to share.

The second reading from John was asking us to love each other because love is from God and is a gift. When we see love in other people, when we feel love ourselves and the love of others, we know God. If God's love is in us, it will radiate to others. Harvest is about a celebration of generosity – of receiving and sharing all that we have. It's also a time to reflect on what we should be doing all year round.

Many thanks to Rev Margaret Stark who takes our services in a unique, informal and humorous style, and to everyone who attended or helped in the preparation of the church. We will have a Remembrance Service on 9th November at 2pm. We look forward to seeing you.

Report of the MAC meeting on 29th September 2025

- Archdeacon Mark Preece attended the meeting and ran through the Vacancy process and possible timescale for getting a new Ministry Area Leader. The best possible case would be to have someone in post after next Easter.
- The Quinquennial Reports on all the churches had now been received and lists are being drawn up of work priorities for our buildings. There will be a considerable amount to get done and it needs careful planning.
- It was agreed to do some work on All Saints heating to get it going, plus the underfloor heating will be investigated to see if can be made to work.
- St Peter's organ will have some renovation work which entails removing it for a time.
- Work is progressing towards an amenity building at the St Peter's site. A survey and drawings will be commissioned.
- There was a long discussion on the Common Fund pledge for next year and it was agreed to increase our contribution by 4% to £114,400.

Revd. Jimmy Young ended his three year stint as Chair of Cytûn at the Annual General Meeting held at All Saints Church on Wednesday 10th September.

He reflected on his third and final year in office using Psalm 133, 'Behold, how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity'. He focussed on the many good things that happened over the past year: the clifftop activities which have flourished and widened to reach young children, families and care home residents; the youth events; the Base Camp and Homework Club going from strength to strength; the monthly prayer meetings, a real place of God's presence; the annual retreat; the 'Bereavement Journey' beginning its fourth course; the Christian Aid group with its many fundraising activities which keep us looking outward; the 'Here for You' leaflet which is a real connecting point for all kinds of people; the Good Friday and Easter morning services attended by so many. He thanked everyone who does anything for Cytun in any way, and acknowledged the privilege of serving and his enthusiasm about what is to come. Rev. Young accepted with thanks the small token of appreciation from all those people he involved for all he has done for Cytun.

The new chairman, David Llewellyn, is away on a sabbatical at the moment so the meeting was chaired by Keith Howells.

It was reported that the Salvation Army now needs a licence to play in Penarth. The cost of this licence is £500. It is not clear whether the SA will make this payment to play. The Christmas season in the town centre will be the poorer if they are unable to purchase a licence this year.




The evenings are drawing in and we are going to take advantage of an even bigger television (thanks to sub warden Adrian) by holding monthly film nights.



Prayers for Palestine

Mel Griffin reports on the recent three-hour Prayer Vigil

On the evening of Sunday 5th October, All Saints Church hosted a three-hour prayer vigil for the people of Gaza. Attendees were encouraged to drop in for as much time as they could spare between 6 and 9pm. There was a good turnout on the night, with representation from churches across the Ministry Area as well as other churches within Penarth Cytûn.

The vigil was organised by Rev. Susannah, Mel Griffin and Hugh Bryant, who each led a one-hour section. Towards the beginning, those attending formed a 'Red Line for Gaza' outside the church, in support of Christian Aid's campaign to call out the fact that many red lines have been crossed in the course of Israeli government action in the region.





The evening comprised a mix of prayers, Bible readings, poetry, music and video testimonies from Gaza, with plenty of time for silent reflection throughout as well as the opportunity to light a candle of hope. Prayer topics included:

- an end to the suffering of innocent civilians
- the work of the aid agencies
- the release of all hostages
- a lasting peace in the Middle East

Despite the encouraging and hopeful signs of progress towards peace in recent days, there is still a long and complex road ahead, so continued prayer is definitely needed. Future (shorter) vigils may be organised, so watch this space!
